

Future of Enrolled Nursing Practice

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Setting the scene – Enrolled Nurse workforce (NCNZ annual report, 2014).

- > 2871 ENs with annual practising certificates
- > 2828 worked in direct care roles
- Median age 55
- > 81% had been working for more than 15 years
- > 8% had been working for fewer that 6 years





EN graduates destination data 2012-2014

Nurse Educators in the Tertiary Sector – this was post the last changes made to the enrolled nursing scope and education standards



2019 – what has changed in 2024?

- Enrolled nurses believed that their scope of practice was poorly understood by other regulated health professionals.
- Enrolled Nurses feel 'under-utilised"
- Requirement to work under direction and delegation is restrictive and interpretation is highly variable
- Employment options for enrolled nurses vary considerably between regions.
