Who are we?

February 1999 - HMS Trust was established as a Charitable Trust and was originally located in Knox Street in the central city. The purpose of the Trust was to support settlement of newcomers, recognising that language is a barrier to information.

The first service offered by the HMST was interpreting which still operates today under the name **Decypher**. We provide over 1500 interpreting jobs per month.

October 2004 – The Trust moved to the Marist Rugby Club located on Claudelands Park.

Now known as The Settlement Centre Waikato.



What we do

We support newcomers to Hamilton – mainly migrants and refugees to settle, connect and thrive.

We provide a range of services and programmes to support their settlement journey including:

- Employment
- Digital literacy
- Information services
- Transport driver licence and bike training
- Decypher interpreting and translation services
- Events Ethnic Football Festival, World Refugee Day
- Budgeting
- Health hub
- Housing Support



What is the difference?

Refugees	Migrants
 Flee conflict and persecution and have no alternative but to leave Lose their homes and livelihoods Often separated from families Many experience violence, discrimination and deprivation Political, economic and/or environmental refugees No documentation 	 Make a conscious choice to leave Seek information about their potential new home Study language & explore employment opportunities Plan their travel and take belongings with them Say goodbye to important people in their lives Can return home at any time without risk

Who is a refugee?

The 1951 Refugee Convention defined a refugee as a person who ...

"owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted

for **reasons** of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion ...

is outside the country of his/her nationality ...

and is unable or, owing to such fear, unwilling to avail himself/herself of the **protection** of that country."

The Global Context


Nearly 70% of all global refugees come from just five countries.

What are the five countries?

1.	Syria	6.5 million refugees
2.	Afghanistan	6.1 million refugees
3.	Ukraine	6.0 million refugees
4.	Venezuela	5.6 million refugees
5 .	South Sudan	2.2 million refugees

Who do we settle? 1990's to present

Afghan, Somali, Congolese, Burmese, Colombian, Eritrean, Bhutanese, Djibouti, Syrian




How do UN-quota refugees arrive in NZ?

1. Flee across a border



3. Refugee camps or urban cities spaces




2. Register with UNHCR



- This is long process and can take up to 20 years.
- Average time in a refugee camp is 14 years

Process for UN-quota refugees

- 1. UNHCR refers refugees to NZ Government- (Immigration NZ)
- 2. Immigration NZ selects / interviews before arrival Offshore.
- 3. Arrival
 - When refugees arrive in NZ, they are given a Permanent Resident Visa
 - After 5 years they can apply for NZ citizenship

Can stay here from 5 weeks to 3 months

- Supported by staff 1 2 years
- Supported by volunteers 3 6 months




















Five goals of NZ resettlement strategy towards independence
