Call for Abstracts: NZNO Women's Health College Free Paper Award

The Women's Health College (WHC), NZNO, Tōpūtanga Tapuhi Kaitiaki O Aotearoa acknowledges the extensive knowledge possessed by health professionals working across women's health in New Zealand, Aotearoa. We invite our colleagues to submit an abstract paper for presentation at our annual conference, which will be held from 15-17 May in Auckland. This event offers a fantastic opportunity to share nursing wisdom, discuss the latest research & treatments and educate colleagues on the broad spectrum of women's health services today.

Please let us know if this is your first time presenting a paper at any conference, as there is a \$250 award for the best first-time presenter.

A \$500 prize will be awarded to the nurse who presents the best paper on women's health issues.

All abstracts must be submitted in the following format

- <u>Title</u> Presentation title
- <u>Authors</u> All authors are listed and presenter's name/s are underlined
- Organisation Presenter's organisations are listed, and
- <u>Contact details</u> Presenter's postal & e-mail addresses and phone number are provided.

*Please confirm whether you're happy for your contact details to be included in the conference booklet.

The body of abstract can be formatted in two styles

- 1. Research abstract Aim, Methods, Results, and Conclusions.
- 2. <u>Opinion piece</u> Objective, Discussion, and Conclusions.

The abstract should be limited to 250 words, formatted in MS Word, rich text format, using 10 pt Times New Roman font and single-spaced.

Abstracts must be submitted electronically by email to Jill Lamb jillian.lamb@cdhb.health.nz.

All accepted papers will have their abstract and author profile published in the conference booklet. Authors will be notified of the review committee's decision by 28 February 2025.

All presenters are required to register for the conference. Each presenter will have 10 minutes for their presentation, and 5 minutes for questions. Presentations must be in PowerPoint format and should be given to the sound technician on a memory stick at the conference.

The closing date for abstract (paper) submissions is 20 February 2025.

Guidelines for Poster Presentations

The body of the abstract can be formatted as follows

- 1. <u>Research abstract</u> Aim, methods, results, and conclusions.
- 2. <u>Opinion piece</u> Objective, discussion, conclusions and criteria.
- The abstract should be in MS Word or rich text format, limited to 250 words, formatted in 10 pt Tahoma, and single spaced.
- All abstracts must be submitted electronically to Jill Lamb at <u>jillian.lamb@cdhb.health.nz</u> as only electronic submissions will be accepted.
- The maximum dimensions for posters are 100 cm x 150 cm.
- All accepted posters will have their abstract and author profile published in the conference booklet.
- Authors will be notified of the review committee's decision by 28 February 2025.
- All presenters must be registered for the conference.

The closing date for abstract (poster) submissions is 20 February 2025.

You will not be expected to present your poster to conference delegates. Instead, you will be allocated a time to discuss the background of your poster and answer any questions.

Nadine's current role as Charge Nurse Manager of the WHIRI Hohipera team at Waikato Hospital. Nadine focuses on supporting whānau with outpatient appointments through a caring and holistic approach.

Before this, she worked as a Senior Relationship Manager at the National Cervical Screening Programme and has extensive experience in nursing and cervical screening.

Nadine is a Smear Your Mea Trust member and Hei Ahuru Mowai member. She also holds roles with Midlands Pinnacle, Sexual Wellbeing Aotearoa, Wahine Connect and DAA Group. Nadine is passionate about whānau-centric health and has dedicated years to making cervical screenings accessible by bringing them to homes, communities, and events. She follows the inspiring words of Te Puea Herangi: "mahia te mahi hei painga mo te iwi," meaning "do the work for the betterment of the people."

Fun fact - Nadine is an only child, but her dad is one of 15, and her mum is one of four. She's got over 200 in her parent's immediate whanau lines and knows most of their birthdates and where everyone fits in age - she's that 'go to' cousin.





Remarkable healthcare advocate for wāhine Māori

Wahine Māori health practitioner Professor Bev Lawton (Ngāti Porou) NZOM, from Te Herenga Waka—Victoria University of Wellington, has been recognised with a prestigious award named after esteemed Māori cancer researcher Dr Maarire Goodall.

Published 1 October 2024 in Victoria University of Wellington publication.

The Maarire Goodall Award recognises excellence in leadership and long service commitment in advancing Māori health. The award was presented at the Te Ora Hui ā-Tau and Scientific Conference in Rotorua on 28 September 2024. This conference is the annual meeting of Te Ohu Rata o Aotearoa, The Māori Medical Practitioners Association.

"I'm really privileged to do the work I'm doing, so I'm even more delighted that me and my team have been recognised by our peers for it," says Professor Lawton. "It's a difficult time now for Māori health, a lot of things have been rolled back on us. I had the chance to do a presentation, and it was good to be able to talk about the work we are doing at the centre that is impacting people's lives positively."

Professor Lawton is the founder and director of Te Tātai Hauora o Hine, National Centre of Women's Health Research Aotearoa. Known for her lobbying to see HPV testing for cervical cancer, which replaced smear tests from mid-September last year, used as a primary screening method, her research on women's and children's health has led to changes in policy and practice in Aotearoa and internationally.

Professor Rawinia Higgins, Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Māori and Engagement says Professor Lawton is a remarkable advocate of health care for wāhine Māori.

"Her successful campaign for HPV self-testing to be used as a simple way of screening for cervical cancer will have a life-extending effect on all women, but particularly wāhine Māori, who are more than twice as likely as non-Māori women to be diagnosed with cervical cancer." Professor Lawton is an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit, and a Distinguished Fellow of the Royal College of General Practice. She also received the 2021 Women of Influence Award in the Innovation, Science and Health category, the Royal Australia and New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists Māori Women's Health Award in 2020, and the Health Research Council's Beaven Medal for excellence in translational health research in 2023. "For me it was quite an important award to receive," says Professor Lawton. "It's the recognition of the science, and then it's the advocacy to get the programmes going, and that feeds into activism. It was so great within the HPV project to be able to use the science to translate into usual care, working with the Ministry of Health in real time."

Celebrating another of our amazing members: Rebecca Cornish Registered nurse and midwife.

I have been a nurse for 25 years and a midwife for 21 years now.

I work at Wellington Hospital in the Women's Acute Assessment Unit and in Antenatal Clinics.

As a dual registered Nurse/ Midwife, it was hard to find a role where I could use both professions. Twelve years ago, I joined the Acute Assessment team at Wellington Hospital which sees Gynaecology and Obstetrics patients for acute problems. This was the perfect job to complement and extend my skill set, and I gained excellent clinical experience working with women across the lifespan.

Over the years I have also taken on an increasing role in Antenatal Clinics and last year began doing the Obstetric Triaging, alongside a Specialist Obstetrician. Obstetric triage is a clinical decision-making process to prioritise patients based on maternal and foetal factors. This process enables us to allocate resources and medical care to provide appropriate treatments at the right time and place.

Referrals come in and I review them. I identify the acuity and severity of any individual risk factors and create a plan in consultation with the triaging Obstetrician. This may be to provide advice only regarding scans, blood tests, monitoring or to prioritise appointment schedules for individuals, or it may be to make a comprehensive pregnancy plan through to birth.

My role in triage ensures that the pregnant person will receive appropriate diagnostic services, and referrals, to facilitate informed decision making and a safe pregnancy pathway. Through this process I am in a strong position to ensure that the person can access the Specialist Obstetrician who is best able to meet their unique needs, with a strong focus on cultural responsiveness. It is known that significant access inequities exist across maternity and post-natal care, for Māori and Pacific women. Te Puna Wairua is an outreach Antenatal Clinic that has been established within our community to provide services under one roof for hapū mama to access the support they need, when they need it. My role is to ensure that people can access this service, improving wellbeing and pregnancy outcomes where hapū mama are able to provide their pepi with the best possible start in life.

My role in triage has increased my clinical knowledge significantly to help me identify the things we need to be worried about in pregnancy and how to manage them. With such significant advances in reproductive technology and in Obstetric care, we are seeing more pregnant people with complex medical histories, who prior to these advances, weren't able to get pregnant or were advised against it.

A complex pregnancy can involve psychosocial or biomedical risk factors that affect the health of the mother or baby. People may have significant cardiac conditions, diabetes, renal failure, cancer, syndromes and diseases, and pregnancy can have significant health impacts for the mother or compromise the wellbeing of the foetus.

I am able to draw on my broader health knowledge from my nursing background to better understand the needs of these patients and frequently liaise with other disciplines to assist in triaging - Obstetric Physician, Cardiology, Neurology, Endocrine, Social Work. Triaging in a busy hospital is a diverse but challenging and busy job. It is great to be able to use my combined health knowledge to complement the role.
